3 Observations about Trials in James 1:1-4

- 1. Trials are inevitable.
 - Gk. hotan "when," not "if"
- 2. Trials are varied.
 - Gk. poikilois (all sizes & shapes)
- 3. Trials are purposeful.
 - Gk. hoti ("because")
 - Gk. hina ("so that")

"Trials" & "Temptations" in James 1

- Noun: Gk. *peirasmois*
- Verb: Gk. Peirazō
- Two different but related senses in the NT: positive & negative
 - <u>Positive</u>—Testing, trial, putting to the test with the intent of confirming and strengthening the virtue of someone.
 ex.) Abraham was tested by God (Heb. 11:17; Gen. 22:1-22)
 - <u>Negative</u>-Temptation, enticement to sin
 ex.) Jesus was tempted by the devil (Matt. 4:1-11; cf. Mark 1:12-13; Luke 4:1-12)

"Trials" & "Temptations" in James 1 (cont.)

 The <u>external & objective</u> "trials" that are given by God to strengthen our faith and develop perseverance, can become an <u>internal & subjective</u> source of "temptation" when not received with a proper attitude.

The Key to Responding to Trials in James 1:19-26

- <u>4 Commands of Responding to the Word of God</u>:
- 1. Be quick to hear/listen to the Word of God.
- 2. Be slow to speak.
- 3. Be slow to become angry.
- 4. Receive the Word of God with humility.

"Hypocritical Religion" in James 1:26–2:13

- Personal favoritism & discrimination (external)
 - "Favoritism": Gk. prosopolempsia ("to receive a face")
 - "Discriminate": Gk. *diakrinō* ("to judge through")

The Misuse of Words/Tongue in James 3

- <u>Context: The misuse of words/tongue in public</u> worship
 - Teaching: Position of honor & prestige (responsibility, accountability)
 - Some were using this position of teaching to air one's own opinions & divisive language to tear down others
 - Test of a Spirit-controlled person: use of his/her tongue
