Jesus' Metaphor of the Vine & the Branches in John 15

- Jesus–True Vine
- God the Father–Gardener
- Branches—Disciples
 - > 2 Kinds of Branches (Disciples)
 - 1. Fruitful
 - 2. Fruitless

2 Kinds of Disciples in Jesus' Vine Metaphor in John 15

2 Kinds of Branches:

- 1. Fruitful (True Believers)
 - The Eleven
- 2. Fruitless (False Believers)
 - Judas

"All that the Father gives Me will come to Me, and whoever comes to Me I will never drive away." (John 6:37)

"My sheep listen to my voice; I know them and they follow Me. I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of my hand." (John 10:27-28)

"Likewise every good tree bears good fruit, but a bad tree bears bad fruit. A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, and a bad tree cannot bear good fruit. Every tree that does that bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Thus, by their fruit you will recognize them." (Matt. 7:17-20)
