The 5 Warning Passages in the Book of Hebrews

- 1. Warning #1 (2:1-4): THE PERIL OF NEGLECT
 - > The path to glory is the path of suffering
- 2. Warning #2 (3:7-4:13): THE PERIL OF DISOBEDIENCE
 - > The path to rest is the path of trusting
- 3. Warning #3 (5:11-6:20): THE PERIL OF IMMATURITY
 - > The path to growth is the path of obeying
- 4. Warning #4 (10:26-31): THE PERIL OF REJECTION
 - The path to reward is the path of enduring
- 5. Warning #5 (12:25-29): THE PERIL OF REFUSAL
 - > The path to holiness is the path of discipline

4 Views on the Warning Passages

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3 Reasons for the Superiority of Jesus' Priesthood over the Aaronic Priesthood in Hebrews 7

1. Jesus' priesthood is superior to Aaron's because Melchizedek was superior to Abraham (Levi) (vv. 1-10)

Melchizedek > Abraham (Levi)

Jesus > Levi (Aaron)

Jesus' priesthood > Aaronic priesthood

Melchizedek in Jewish Literature

-Beyond the Old Testament references, the figure of Melchizedek is mentioned in the following:

Dead Sea Scrolls, *Melchizedek* (11QMelch), where Melchizedek, similarly to the archangel Michael, performs eschatological judgment upon the righteous and the wicked.

Philo, *Allegorical Interpretation* 3.25-26, where he is referred to as "worthy of God's own priesthood."

Josephus, *Jewish Antiquities* 179-182, where he is referred to as "priest of God."

Babylonian Talmud, Sukkah 52b, where he is linked with Elijah.

-Melchizedek also appears in gnostic texts. In an apocalyptic text named *Melchizedek* from Nag Hammadi (Codex IX, 1), Melchizedek is identified with Jesus. Mention of Melchizedek also is found in *Pistis Sophia*. An earlier Melchizedek is mentioned in 2 Enoch 71-72, in this case a priest taken by the archangel Michael to paradise, where he remains eternally.

3 Reasons for the Superiority of Jesus' Priesthood over the Aaronic Priesthood in Hebrews 7 (cont.)

- 2. Jesus' priesthood is superior to Aaron's because the Levitical priesthood was set aside (vv. 11-19)
 - It couldn't bring perfection (v. 11)
 - II. It was associated with the Law (v. 12)
 - III. It was based on legal ancestry from Levi (vv. 13-17)
 - IV. It was weak & useless, and made nothing perfect (vv. 18-19a)
 - V. It didn't enable people to draw near to God (v. 19b)

3 Reasons for the Superiority of Jesus' Priesthood over the Aaronic Priesthood in Hebrews 7 (cont.)

- 3. Jesus' priesthood is superior to Aaron's because He Himself is a better priest (vv. 20-28)
 - i. He was confirmed by an oath-Ps. 110:4 (vv. 20-22)
 - ii. He lives forever-permanent priesthood (vv. 23-24)
 - iii. He Himself is sinless-He is able to meet our need (vv. 25-26)
 - iv. He offered Himself once for all—therefore, there is no need for daily sacrifice (vv. 27-28)
